Costume Design

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Course Catalog Description: Lecture/Laboratory application of the fundamentals of design, composition, color theory, and figure drawing as they relate to costume design. Includes script/character analysis and project design work with an emphasis on visualization of design concepts and costume renderings.

Course Objectives: This course is intended to give you an introduction to Costume Design. By the end of this course you should understand and be able to apply to costume design:

- > The elements and principles of design
- Script and character analysis
- Design Concepts
- Figure Drawing & Rendering Techniques

- Production Paperwork including Budgeting and Scheduling
- Color Theory
- > Artwork as Inspiration
- Portfolios
- > Fabric

Course Philosophy: I believe students are as much responsible for their own education as their professors are. It is imperative that you read the textbook or script before coming to class and spend time working in your sketchbooks. In class we can clarify and synthesize the information you have read and add real life examples and situations to help you understand. 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Exams: The exam will cover all assigned readings and lectures. Your exams will be kept on file in my office and you are welcome to review the questions during my office hours or by appointment at any point during the semester.

Makeup Exams: It is my policy not to give makeup exams. If you miss the exam a research paper or project may be able to fulfill those points but will be assigned at my discretion. Makeup exams will only be given in extreme circumstances, again at my discretion, and may be essay or given orally during final exam week. If you know you will miss an exam I suggest you contact me significantly prior to the scheduled exam. There is *no guarantee* you will have the opportunity to make up those points.

General criteria for grading assignments in sketchbook:

- Assignment finished on time
- Creatively executed
- Neatly executed
- Work clearly pertains to the assignment

Late Assignments and Makeup Work: Late Assignments have a base value of 50% of the original point value. You can request permission to do double work to achieve the full point value. These opportunities are available by request and at my discretion. In other words, your assignments are like bills - if you don't "pay" them on time you have to pay interest. So the "price" doubles and you have to do a double amount of work to get the same point value.

Sketch Books: You will need to maintain two sketchbooks. One sketchbook will be used for figure drawing, the second for design exercises. I will give you figures you may trace to use in your design sketchbook, but you may not trace in your figure drawing sketchbook. The guidelines in the calendar represent the minimum requirements. I always encourage you to draw more and push yourself to the next level. You are not allowed to labor over these assignments for hours. You will do yourself a favor by learning to draw quickly. The design and figure drawing sketchbooks should be presentation quality. We will discuss the format in class.

Academic Dishonesty: Academic dishonesty is unacceptable. UCF is committed to a policy of honesty in academic affairs. It can be generally defined as giving or receiving aid in examinations or on assignments which are intended to be done individually or the presentation of the work of other persons as one's own.

On quizzes and examinations, all information other than that which is in your head is unauthorized unless the instructor specifically informs the class otherwise. No talking or communication of any type is authorized during the taking of an examination or between students who have completed the examination and those who have not. Any talking or looking in the direction of another person's paper is presumed to be cheating and will be treated as such. Leaving the room while taking an exam will be considered at attempt at academic dishonesty. Gather tissues, extra pencils, etc. before the exam begins.

- (2) Plagiarism whereby another's work is deliberately used or appropriated without any indication of the source, thereby attempting to convey the impression that such work is the student's own. **This includes written and visual materials.** Any student failing to properly credit ideas or materials taken from another has plagiarized.
- (3) A student who has assisted another in any of the aforementioned breach of standards shall be considered equally culpable.

You will be held accountable and responsible for your actions. Disciplinary action will be taken against those caught cheating and may be grounds for dismissal.
